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Diversity at Community Colleges



Recent protests about racism and lack of inclusion of minorities at the four-year institutions around the country have not spread to community colleges. Community colleges are open-access and have strong programs to encourage acceptance and inclusion. So although they may not be susceptible to these protests, it still might be a good time to examine diversity at community colleges.

Each community college has a specific service area it supports. Census data is used to determine the percentage of minority population in a community college's service area. This includes all population that is not "white, non-Hispanic."

Data from the National Community College Benchmark Project reports the percentage of minority credit students at the college which can then be compared to the percentage of minority population of the community college service area and reported as a ratio.
